### Message from Rabbi Jan Katz

### What do "Wicked" and Hanukkah Have in Common?

The much-hyped film "Wicked, Part I," has certainly come to my attention. For one, the screen-writer, Dana Fox, is a Rochester hometown "person of the hour," and a high school classmate of my daughter's. For another, as the prequel to the dreamy idealism of "The Wizard of Oz," the storyline of "Wicked" provides a starkly realistic midrash on so many human and Jewish ethical values.

The musical movie was adapted from writer Gregory Maguire's 1995 novel, a further adaptation of "The Wizard of Oz" (originally written by L. Frank Baum). Like Maguire's novel, "Wicked" explores how and why one becomes a villain, in this case the Wicked Witch of the West. The young Elphaba Thropp isn't a witch at all, but a morally courageous girl ostracized for her bright green skin and erratic magical abilities. Indeed, she and Glinda, the future Good Witch become unlikely friends and college roommates. The arrangement does not work out in the end, but credit is certainly given for their intentions.

Elphaba begins the film longing for acceptance, but becomes invested in the plight of the fraudulent Wizard of Oz's talking animals, who face a campaign of marginalization: harassed, threatened and forced from their jobs. The explanation given by her "goat" professor is that a backlash began following a recent period of economic hardship: "Food grew scarce, people grew hungrier and angrier. And the question became, 'Whom can we blame?'" In the summarized words of film reviewer, John Doherty, the film is about those in power or those seeking power, or those blindly following those seeking power, who seek out scapegoats to redirect popular anger, scapegoats who suffer loss of dignity, isolation, invalidation of their core identities, and violence against them. To what can this be compared?

Fast backward to the Hanukkah narrative of 168 BCE. The villainous Greek Syrian King Antiochus, in his ruthless quest to conquer the Middle East, forces the Jewish people, his subjects living in the land of Israel, to renounce their unique beliefs and practices and adopt the Greek way of life. Antiochus initiates a campaign to

delegitimize all that was sacred to the Jews. He enters the Holy Temple in Jerusalem, destroys all the sacred items within, and slays those who would not turn to pagan practices, while also taking Jewish women captive. The First Book of Maccabees tells us that the city of Jerusalem "was in mourning and covered with confusion."

Today, would such a leader as Antiochus need to nullify the religions of those under his rule and protection in order to maintain and increase control? Thankfully, we live in a time where diversity and inclusion legally and morally replace forced uniformity. We live in a time where we meet people where they are—where Elphaba can be green and fly, and where Jews can be "Hanukkah." At least, in theory. . .

Today, would Jews, like their Maccabean ancestors, persevere to maintain God's gift to Abraham of the land of Israel and proudly stand erect in the face of isolation and Antisemitic rhetoric and acts? Yes, we would, and we are living out the Maccabees' courage, resilience, their ability to persevere in adversity, to harness the knowledge of our history and the truth of our faith in order to protect ourselves and to survive this moment in history just as the Jewish people in the time of the Maccabees.

We pray for the brightness of Hanukkah lights at the end of the tunnel for the remaining hostages. We pray for our own spiritual strength to deflect the "Whack-A-Mole" of repeated anti-Zionist and anti-Jewish protests, media disinformation, and violent escalations against Jews everywhere. Let us focus on gratitude for our friends and allies, the celebration of our holidays, and the eternal well of wisdom from our traditions and sacred texts – they are a Tree of Life, an Etz Chayim, for us to cling to in nurture, protection, and pride!

part was easy, but <u>where</u> would we live? I told Joe that it had to be near a synagogue.





- Horizons Counseling Center on Beacon Street West.

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
