# Message from Rabbi Jan Katz

Dearest TBIers and Beyond,

Perhaps you can relate: Ever since I can remember, I have planned my daily tasks and activities in advance, what I needed to prepare, prioritize, and put into motion for the day at hand and the days ahead, always seeking to make each part, each step fit neatly into the whole of each day, each goal, each vision. It's no wonder that the backsplash in my kitchen is a pure white tetris pattern, echoing my desired MO. I have also been guided by what my loving parents would have said or done, what my faith demands, and what those around me need me to say and do in order to serve them well.

But, at this very moment, your spiritual leader's world and clear purpose appear to be unraveling or even imploding. Purim is almost two months out, but it feels like Purim right now—topsy-turvy, inside/outside, and upside down. So much needs fixing and healing—actually too much, I have decided, for one human or all humans: how to both maintain our awareness of global, national, and local news and to filter out what is untrue, unhealthy, and unhelpful; who to help locally during these unprecedented times of need; how to wisely and compassionately defend our Jewish values and beliefs; how to stand up for Israel loudly and confidently; and how to nurture the necessary human connection between cherished colleagues, friends, family members, congregants, and all deserving of our love and attention!

The Exodus narrative reminds us that even in a prolonged state of wilderness living, the *eirev rav*, the "mixed multitude" of Israelites who fled Egypt became one nation, guided by Moses, aka "the humble one," who, mentored and marshalled by God, learned to listen and respond to his struggling and frightened flock, and insisted time and again that adhering to God's commandments towards justice and mercy would result in reaching the Promised Land and a life of freedom and prosperity.

Moses, spurred on by God's direct instructions, taught the Israelites by example, because he had no choice, to open themselves to the challenges of the dessert, the absence of enough water and food, the battles with dessert peoples, the uncertainties of each place where they pitched camp and of their promised destination so very far in the distance.

Moses had to have known that we carry within ourselves the power and resilience to protect ourselves and to protect others. And if we care for one another, show up for one another in moments of struggle, grief, fear, and even celebration, we help ward off the forces that seek to harm us. The Israelites proved their resilience, not without setbacks, both physical and moral, but nevertheless, we have endured to this day!

There are a myriad of quotes, poems, essays, articles by our brothers and sisters in faith and in allyship that all of us continue to turn to these days for comfort, for approbation, for spiritual strength, for hope, for that which gives meaning to who we are and the future we want the next generation to inherit. In this, Merav Roth resonates: "I am both a sadder person, with a heart broken daily by the direct encounters with victims of unimaginable human atrocities, and a more believing person—believing in the spirit of humanity, in its beauty, nobility, and goodness. As a nation, as individuals, as survivors, we are not only what has been destroyed. We are the repair, the belief, and the life that endures."

My path through this short message has led me to conclude that the human connection holds immense power. As long as we aspire to be a resilient and intraconnected people and as long as I can serve you and we can serve each other's need to be seen, heard, and cared for, that is the antidote to the primordial *tohu vavohu* – the chaos that was initially replaced by God's creation and the human creative spark in Genesis and that resurfaces periodically to remind and remand us to our higher purpose of *Tikkun Olam*.

Kim'a kim'a, little by little, step by step, says our midrash, on the road to the Messianic Age. Here's to every single large and small act of loving kindness that we will do in the days ahead, individually and together, to affirm our values and our part on this sacred road.

# Board Member Musings



## "The Rabbis Go South" - The Story of 16 Rabbis in 1964

Greetings from our winter retreat in St. Augustine, Florida, the oldest continuously occupied city in the United States. Founded in 1565 by the Spanish, St. Augustine was also the 'cradle of American Catholicism' in an age that correlates to the Spanish Inquisition, when Jews were required to become Catholic or be put to death. This raises the question: were Conversos (Jews who were forced to convert) amongst the explorers who came to conquer the New World and settle St. Augustine? The <a href="St. Augustine Jewish Historical Society">St. Augustine Jewish Historical Society</a> (SAJHS) is dedicated to uncovering the potential of Jewish heritage in the region by researching the surnames of the early explorers. The SAJHS also focuses on other aspects of Jewish life in the city, from its founding to the present.

The SAJHS, under the leadership of Rabbi Merrill Shapiro, has brought one such pivotal moment to prominent attention. In June 1964 sixteen rabbis traveled to St. Augustine at the invitation of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. They came to support the local African American community in their fight against segregation. These rabbis participated in marches and demonstrations and were ultimately arrested and jailed. They were at the segregated Monson Motel when black youth jumped into the pool in an act of protest. They were with the young blacks who sat down at the segregated lunch counter to order food. It may not be a coincidence that on July 2, 1964 the Civil Rights Act was enacted.

Each year on June 18th, the SAJHS commemorates their actions by reading their powerful letter,

"Why We Went to St. Augustine," written during their imprisonment. In this letter, they declared:

"We came to St. Augustine mainly because we could not stay away. We could not say no to Martin Luther King, whom we always respected and admired and whose loyal friends we hope we shall be in the days to come. We could not pass by the opportunity to achieve a moral goal by moral means – a rare modern privilege – which has been the glory of the non-violent struggle for civil rights. We came as Jews who remember the millions of faceless people who stood quietly, watching the smoke rise from Hitler's crematoria. We came because we know that, second only to silence, the greatest danger to man is loss of faith in man's capacity to act."

This inspiring story is now featured in the recently released podcast The Rabbis Go South. It exemplifies the Jewish principle of Tikkun Olam – repairing the world. It emphasizes the courage and conviction of these sixteen rabbis who, despite facing potential opposition from within their own congregations, from their own colleagues, and even from the St. Augustine Jewish community, bravely stood up against injustice.

I urge you to listen to this compelling and largely unknown narrative. It offers a refreshing perspective on rabbinic leadership, highlighting their moral consciousness and commitment to social justice.

The St. Augustine Jewish Historical Society honors these rabbis with a plaque along side the plaque marking the site of the former Monson Motel, where these events unfolded.



**NEW HAMPSHIRE'S WILD HISTORY** From Hunter/Gatherers to Agrarian Society to Industrialization to Conservation Impact on Land and Wildlife



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
