### Message from Rabbi Jan Katz

The wheels of time are turning in front of us – a new year and a poignant passing into one quarter of this century! What is our role as Jews, as the Jewish people, at this moment in time?

We are saying *l'hitraot* ("see you again") to Hanukkah. Its story is not really about oil, a miracle, or destruction, or our homes and synagogues smelling of latkes and *sufganiyot* (jelly doughnuts). The most important message of Hanukkah is one of hope – hope in action. Every act that we do individually and as a people may repel the forces that assail us, but our greater mission is assuredly to build and rebuild a more just and kind Jewish and human civilization, like each candle on the menorah, adding to the collective light that dispels the darkness.

When the Jews were expelled from Jerusalem in ancient days, and exiled to Babylonia, the prophet Jeremiah pleaded with our people to maintain their identity, faith, and laws while at the same time contribute to the welfare of Babylon, in order to dispel despair and preserve the hope of salvation and return. The Talmud expanded Jeremiah's exhortation to the principle of *darchei shalom* – paths of peace, meaning the pursuit of peace in an <u>unredeemed</u> world, a peace that speaks not to a distant future but to the here-and-now of unredeemed time, a peace which depends on different groups with incompatible ideals living graciously or at least civilly together without one attempting to impose its beliefs on the others.

In the brilliant book by Rabbi Dr. Jonathan Sacks, of blessed The Clash of Civilizations, Sacks defines antisemitism as the paradigm case of dislike of the unlike. Jews were hated because they were different. His prooftext is the Book of Esther, read on Purim: "There is a certain people dispersed and scattered among the peoples . . . whose laws are different from those of all other people" (Esther 3:8). Sacks acknowledges the challenge of maintaining the dignity of difference in ages dominated by empires with universal aspirations, and we again live in such a time! There are many, understandably, who believe that antisemitism is inevitable and incurable and that any attempt to address it, other than self-defense, is destined to failure. If it were true, it would render all our prayers for peace - and there is virtually no Jewish prayer that does not end with a prayer for peace - futile and in vain.

### What is our role as Jews, as the Jewish people, at this moment in time?

The Talmudic question arises when someone finds themselves with only enough oil for one light on Friday afternoon of Hanukkah. Should one light it as a Hanukkah candle or as a Shabbat light? Maimonides ruled that the person in the household who customarily lights the Shabbat candles should choose, that is, to **defer** to the happiness and peace of the house. The smallest, most domestic form of peace – between family members – takes precedence over even the greatest victory in war. By extension, the greatest cure for the hatred of difference is the principle that "the pious of the nations of the world have a share in the world to come" (Tosefta, Maimonides), meaning that the redemption of others (and hence their equal rights and dignity) does not depend on their sharing our faith.

Even as we struggle to both make sense of the chaos and animosity towards Israel and the Jewish people, even as we are fraught with grief over the fate of the hostages, and even though we are uncertain of what steps we can take to turn the tide in 2025, our tradition emphatically insists that we actively and proudly and openly celebrate our Jewish identity, and also validate those unlike us who are not our enemies or detractors.

We can take on the divine vision and mission of our biblical prophets of hope in action. Towards that goal, please consider taking on a more active role in our Temple B'nai Israel community to ensure our survival and flowering, and please plan to continually reach out and support our non-Jewish community of allies and upstanders, especially by attending the Martin Luther King, Jr. program on January 19. Just as the Talmud teaches that to save one life is to save the whole world (*Pirkei Avot* 4:1), your singular act is the candlelight that illuminates an entire space and beyond.

My family's connection to Laconia began in the mid-1940s. My father Jack (aka Cecil) was a watchmaker on Washington Street in Boston with his father. An opportunity arose when his uncle, Nat Goodman, a jewelry "shlepper" (Yiddish for "carry"- at this time many salesmen delivered their product - no UPS or FedEx!) introduced him to retiring Myer Kasner whose small jewelry store in Laconia was for sale. During the 1950s, TBI was a vibrant hub of Jewish life here in the Lakes Region. Holidays saw the sanctuary packed, so much so, folding chairs were in the aisles. I was fortunate to grow up immersed in its traditions, attending Hebrew school and becoming a Bar Mitzvah at TBI.

In the early 1970s after completing my education and serving in the Army, I returned to Laconia to work alongside my father. I was "invited" by then TBI president Mike Melnick to join the temple and so began my over 50 years of TBI membership.

My recent active involvement began when I replaced Bob Selig as a Trustee of Trust Funds. My career at Sawyers, as well as RASCO Management, was that of a hands on financial officer. As a self proclaimed prudent financial steward and one who strives to live a generous life as to his means, I thought it a reasonable fit

Supporting TBI is a family effort. Judi Rogato, my sister, is part of the food festival team and her husband Jim is on the "We Care" entertainment committee. Gary Morse, my cousin, also a TBI Bar Mitzvah, is an associate member.


My dedication to TBI has led me to encourage unaffiliated Jewish community members, regardless of their preferences, to support our one Lakes Region Jewish home of worship and fellowship, if not for themselves, for the next generation. I believe to achieve that goal and for us to prosper, the leadership of TBI must continue to enhance our welcoming environment that is non judgmental, inclusive of all views/sects and ways of life in a non partisan manner. I strongly support TBI as our spiritual home which actively celebrates and addresses issues which are of concern, and hopefully, common to all Jews such as rising antisemitism and the survival and prosperity of Israel.

I have been a member of TBI since October, 2023 and joined the Board of Directors in early 2024. I had a second home on Winnisquam Lake for 12 years while living and raising a family in Needham, MA. I grew to love the Lakes Region and all it has to offer, and planned to move full time to the area when my son graduated from high school in June, 2023. I sold my home on Winnisquam at that time, along with my home in Needham, and bought a wonderful home on Paugus Bay in Laconia. I love being right on the lake - it is definitely a happy place for me.

Earlier in my life, I lived for 10 years in southern New Hampshire and worked for both Elliot Hospital and Catholic Medical Center in Manchester where I oversaw all marketing and communications. Prior to this, I was a television news anchor and reporter in Lowell, MA after graduating from Emerson College and then worked as a press secretary for a member of Congress. For the past 20 years, I worked in the biotechnology industry leading corporate communications and investor relations for three companies based in Cambridge and Lexington. I retired from full-time work this past July and am now enjoying the flexibility to pursue many interests that I was not able to do while working full time and raising a family. A lot of my time is spent outdoors, either boating on the Big Lake or hiking in the White Mountains, biking, cross-country skiing and snow-shoeing, and finally pursuing a yoga practice which has been a long-time goal.

I made a personal commitment and converted to Judaism in early 2005 after studying at Temple Israel in Boston. I was a member of a Reform synagogue, Temple Beth Avodah in Newton, MA for nearly 20 years. My daughter, Emma, also converted to Judaism before becoming a Bat Mitzvah. She is completing her Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Temple University this year. My son, Charley, is in his second year at Syracuse University pursuing History and Economics, and he attends services with me at TBI when home on breaks.

I am very grateful to have the TBI community in my life. Everyone has been so incredibly warm in welcoming me. I think it is very important to have a Jewish presence in the Lakes Region and am happy to contribute in making TBI such a vibrant and important synagogue.


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### Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Observance in Laconia






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


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
