Message from Rabbi Jan Katz

Are you breathing in the beauty of this broken world? This is a Jewish imperative! The Aish Kodesh (last work of Rabbi Kalonymous Kalman Shapira, a Hasidic scholar who wrote during the Holocaust) wrote that even in grief we must open ourselves to whatever joy we can find, and allow joy to flow in and lift us.

As we leave the drama of the High Holydays and Sukkot/ Simchat Torah, the Jewish calendar cycle brings us into the Hebrew month of Heshvan, called by some *Marheshvan* — bitter Heshvan — because it is the only month in which there is no Jewish holiday to observe. As you might imagine, for rabbis and cantors, it is quite the opposite. We see not an empty spiritual vacuum, but a sigh of relief, an opportunity to reflect on the efficacy of the HH worship and ritual, a retreat back into all the loose threads spinning their webs in our homes, in our offices, and among the mundane domestic tasks of everyday life.

And, for all of us, we re-focus on the upcoming American holiday, Thanksgiving Day. We pay more attention to the Jewish value of *hakarat hatov*—recognizing the good, gratitude for it, and the joy that flows from gratitude. *Hakarat hatov* is not only about the gratitude and joy of the cherished relationships of family and friends, both new and old. *Hakarat hatov* is a wake-up call (without the *shofar*) and reminder of the blessings of all that supports our existence. In the Babylonian Talmud, Rabbi Ben Zoma offers the following teaching:

What labors did Adam have to carry out before he obtained bread to eat? He plowed, he sowed, he reaped, he bound the sheaves, threshed the grain, winnowed the chaff, selected ears, grounded them, sifted the flour, kneaded the dough, and baked. And only then did he eat. Whereas I get up and find all these things done for me. And how many labors did Adam have to carry out before he obtained a garment to wear? He had to shear the sheep, wash the wool, comb it, spin it, weave it, and only then did he have a garment to wear. Whereas I get up and find all these things done for me.

And, the modern version of this lesson, at least for this week, is low tire pressure. I'm not exactly sure what drivers did in the old days when their tires lost significant pressure and there were no air pumps or gas stations close by or those handy-dandy portable re-chargeable air pumps, but I am sure they were more prepared than me, as well as being schooled in the reasons why tire pressure decreases, how and where to look for a leak, and how to solve the problem. This solo driver has always expected instant assistance and an instant fix by others. After an hour of driving tentatively over the Vermont hills, a rest stop gas station attendant offered to teach me how to use what he deemed "a complicated air pump" in order to give me some car repair agency, which I equated (a bit of a stretch) to Adam's agronomic and production knowhow. After multiple tries manipulating the pump, with frustration and impatience and a few silent expletives, the task was successfully completed. This was a trivial inconvenience compared to all the dilemmas of life over which we have little or no control, but nonetheless, the relief of 4 tires having the correct PSI's indicated on the dashboard, and a newly learned skill resulted in my authentic gratitude to the patient and kind rest stop attendant and an intentional awareness of the many people and working parts that enable me to transport myself to TBI, lodge comfortably. and serve you. You know who you are, and I thank you profusely for each and every visit!

Hakarat hatov extends to inanimate objects as well. From the biblical narrative, the Midrash teaches that Moses did not strike the Nile River to catalyze the plague of blood for that would have shown a lack of gratitude to the water which had conveyed him in his tar-inlaid basket to Pharoah's daughter. The notion of hakarat hatov towards nature is a form of Jewish environmentalism. Can we continue to damage the natural world when it has given us so much? The connection between Judaism and gratitude to the earth and its bounty is for a longer and much needed conversation. Stay tuned for Tu Bishvat 2025 and beyond!

For now, I wish you a bountiful and joyous Thanksgiving, with an even greater sense of blessing and gratitude for all that is good!

Meet Your Board of Trustees



Dr. Joel Funk, Board Member, Trustee of the Trust Funds, and our keyboard accompanist

When my wife Melody and I arrived in New Hampshire in 1975, we had no idea we would wind up providing music for TBI for over 35 years! But here we still are!

We moved here from Massachusetts, because I was offered a teaching job in the Psychology Department at Plymouth State College (now University). I taught for 41 years before retiring in 2016. I noticed something about the majority of academics: they subscribed to some version of atheistic materialism. God and religion typically played little or no part in their lives. This brought to the surface an issue that has concerned me my entire life.

On the one hand, my father was a rabbi and I attended Yeshiva for 13 years. My father was a fervent believer in God and our home was quite traditional. On the other hand, I was drawn to the sciences, even majoring in chemistry as an undergraduate, before turning to psychology. Even after 50+ years in the sciences, I still believe in a God who is a supremely intelligent, creative, and moral force in the universe. Where many of the scientists I have known feel that science has essentially replaced religion (and God), the more I study science, the more my belief in God increases!

We can discuss this further at the adult ed we are hosting on November 2; but for now, one example may suffice: DNA, a remarkable molecule. A leading atheistic philosopher named Anthony Flew changed his mind about God's non-existence after examining the scientific evidence, DNA in particular. DNA is a code, he noted, and you cannot have a code without a coder (i.e., God).

So why don't most scientists and other atheists resonate to such ideas? They are typically high on logical IQ, but low in what theologian Abraham Joshua Heschel called "radical amazement," the feeling of the miraculous-ness of Being. We take <u>way</u> too much for granted, like our sense of balance - until we have vertigo!

Many people like me believe in God as the root of all things. Others will argue for "laws of nature", time, and evolution to explain how we got to where we are today. But it seems to me that such scientists and philosophers are sneaking_god_in_through_the_back_door, ascribing Divine powers to material processes.

Well, perhaps I am seriously misguided! You may have a different view. There is much to chew on here and I look forward to opening a dialogue on this thought provoking topic at the Adult Ed session at our home on November 2.

Ken Goodman, Board Member and Co-Founder of We Care

Update from the Rabbi Search Committee

The TBI Rabbinical Search Committee has been hard at work since July to find a successor to Rabbi Katz upon the end of her contract tenure on June 30, 2025. While we are all sad to see Rabbi Katz leave us, we are working closely with the placement service of the Union for Reform Judaism to find a rabbi who can provide the high level of rabbinical leadership we have come to expect at TBI.

We have unique needs as a congregation, in particular our geographic location and the part time nature of the pulpit, so on the recommendation of the URJ we began earlier search process than most congregations. With this early start, I'm happy to report that we've had five applicants, and as deemed by our committee two of them warranted preliminary Zoom interviews to determine if they understand the nature of our pulpit position, and live within a reasonable travel distance to TBI. Again I'm happy to tell you that after these preliminary interviews we are now scheduling them for more in depth interviews, and if all continues to go well these candidates will eventually be scheduled for visits to TBI where they will tour the area, lead services and participate in programming. Congregational feedback will be important for our committee to hear after these visits. Once this feedback is received, our committee can then make a recommendation to the Board for their approval.

While this update focuses on two viable candidates, our application at the URJ is still "live" and more prospects can still have their resumes sent to us now that the High Holiday period has ended. We are very much aware of how difficult any hiring process can be, and the more options we have the better; but in any case we remain optimistic that our committee will provide for a seamless transition at the TBI pulpit come next summer.

The Cat's Pajamas really were "the cat's pajamas!"




